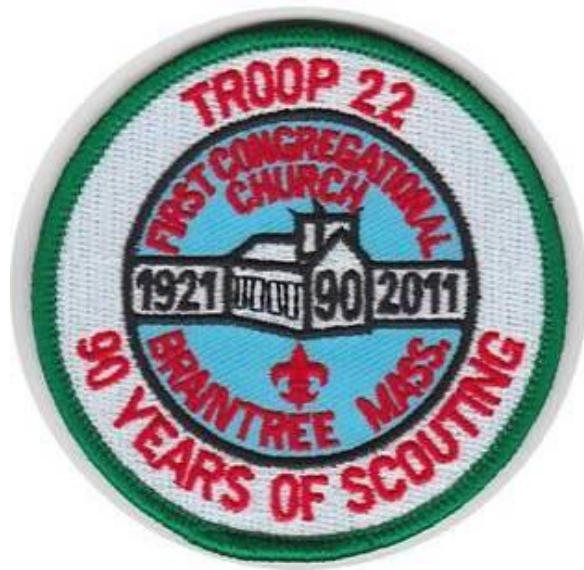

Eagle Scouts: Merit Beyond the Badge

One hundred years after Arthur Eldred of New York earned this nation's first Eagle Scout Award, new, independent research demonstrates the significant, positive impact Eagle Scouts have on society every day. Since it was first awarded in 1912, more than 2 million young men have achieved the Boy Scouts of America's highest rank. The study conducted by Baylor University, Merit Beyond the Badges, found that Eagle Scouts are more likely than men who have never been in Scouting to:

- Have higher levels of planning and preparation skills, be goal-oriented, and network with others
- Be in a leadership position at their place of employment or local community
- Report having closer relationships with family and friends
- Volunteer for religious and nonreligious organizations
- Donate money to charitable groups
- Work with others to improve their neighborhoods

Troop 22 Information

Troop Meetings are held in the Lower Parish Hall at the First Congregational Church at 12 Elm Street, Braintree.

Troop Meeting times are Monday, 7:00pm – 8:30pm, from the first Monday after Labor Day through the second Monday in June. The Troop does not meet on Mondays when there is no school. That would be Holidays, School Vacations and School cancellations due to weather, etc.

The Troop schedules **10 weekend outings** each season with one long term camp scheduled during the summer.

Our Weekend outings include **6 tent outings, 3 Cabin outings and a Ski Trip** during the winter season.

Our Troop attends the Old Colony Council **Summer Camp at Camp Squanto** as it gives the scouts an opportunity to meet and interact with many other Scouts from numerous Troops.

We have scheduled a **high adventure trip every 5 years** with one currently completed in the summer of 2015 to visit Glacier National Park in Montana.

The Troop is also very Service oriented. We have numerous Service Projects scheduled throughout the year. Our Service Projects support our Sponsor, the Town and our extended Community. Attached is a list of Service Projects we support.

The Troop follows BSA policies where the Troop is considered a **Boy-run organization**. It is noted that, for some folks, meetings can look to be a little disorganized at time, but, that is part of the learning process on which BSA is built.

Also, while the Troop believes progression through the Ranks is important for the Scouts, the true benefit is the learning that they will carry with them through the rest of their life.

Sponsor:

- Repainted Two Classrooms at the First Congregational Church
- Rebuilt the Choir Room
- Rebuilt the Library/Media room
- Refurbished the Kitchen
- Repainted Two Additional Class Rooms
- Renovated the outside property of the Church
- Cleared and Re-painted the Stage area in the upper Church Hall

Town of Braintree:

- Refurbished the exterior of the Council on Aging building
- Refurbished the Museum in the basement of the Thayer House

- Created an outside area with benches, flagpole, landscaping and a Bus stop at the Council on Aging
- Built a Fishing Dock at Pond Meadow Park
- Cleared brush and repainted the fence surrounding French's Common
- Cleared brush and repainted the fence surrounding the Leon Harris Park on Elmlawn Road
- Cleared brush, repainted the Tennis Court fence at French's Common; installed two benches

- Repainted the Entrance Hall at St. Thomas More Church
